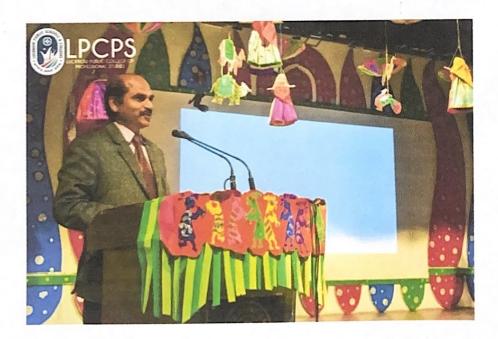
## MARTYR'S DAY

We at LPCPS celebrate this day as a tribute to our martyrs.





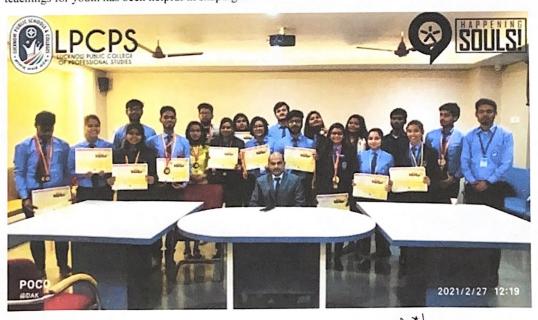


# NATIONAL YOUTH DAY

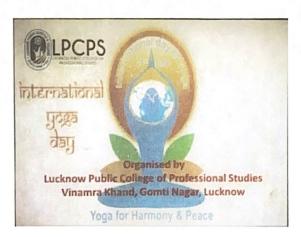

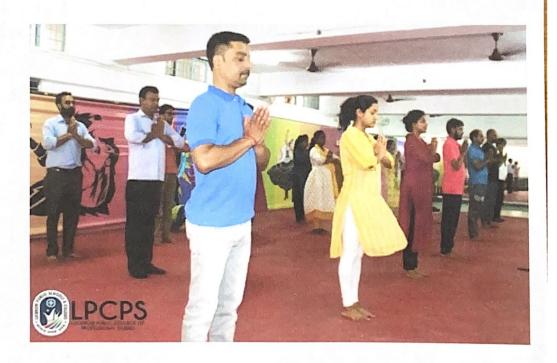

It is time to realize the importance of recognizing and celebrating our heroes and she-roes!

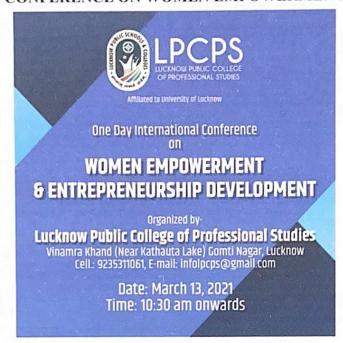
A session on Gender Equality was organized by LPCPS on 20th September 2019.

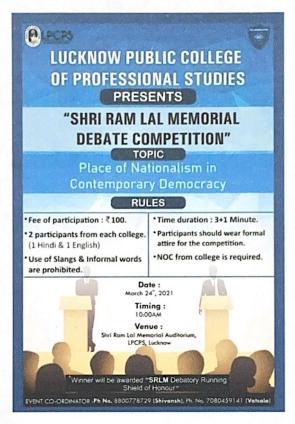

Topic: Place of Nationalism in Contemporary Democracy

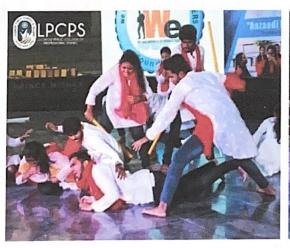

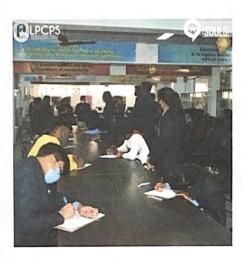


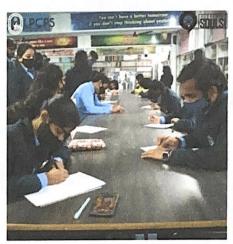


# ESSAY COMPETITION ON INTERNATIONAL MOTHER LANGUAGE DAY

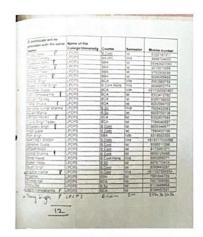
LPCPS organised an inter-college essay writing competition on the occasion of International Mother Language Day.
