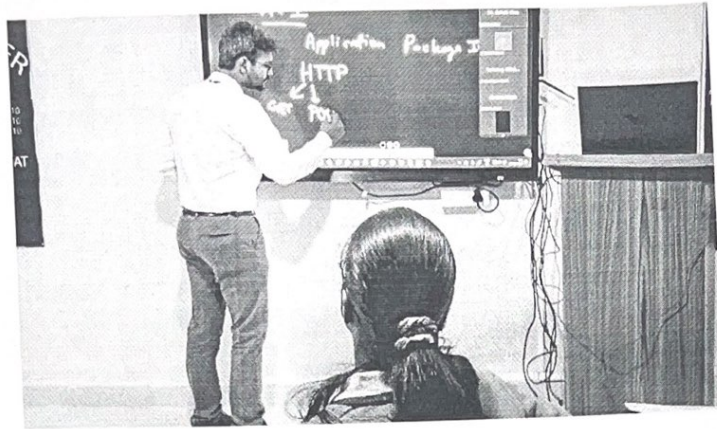
2. Computer lab:

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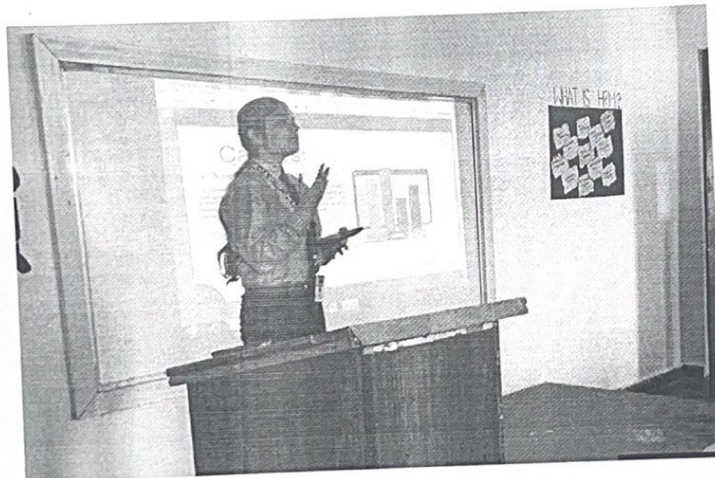
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3. Audio-video classes:

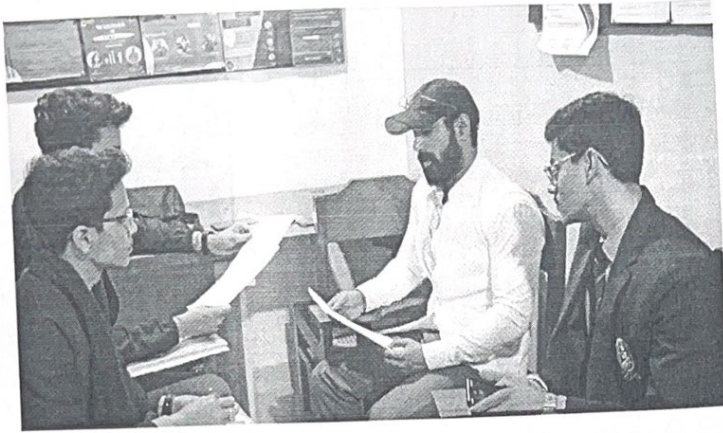
Audio-visual (AV) learning refers to the delivery and utilisation of educational content that includes both sound (auditory stimuli) and sight (visual stimuli).
